Today's Teens' Commitment to Jesus






Committed Christians see Jesus as a relevant figure in their life.



Commitment to Jesus

Only one in six Canadian teens are committed to Jesus.

JESUS COMMITMENT

committed christians: Teenagers who self-identify as Christian and have made a personal commitment to follow Jesus Christ. We'll sometimes refer to this group as "Christ-followers."

NOMINAL CHRISTIANS: Teenagers who self-identify as Christian but have not made a personal commitment to follow Jesus Christ. Barna has previously used the term "nominal Christians" with similar definitions.

ALL OTHERS: Teens who are not Christian and hold some other belief about who Jesus is.







Today's Teens' Engagement with the Bible



Fewer than one in ten teens are Bible engaged.

Engaged


High view of the Bible and read several times a week

Open

High or neutral view of the Bible, but read less than weekly

Disengaged

Skeptics or never read the Bible



Teaching teens to read the Bible is a vital first step toward life-long engagement.

On average, a teen who is engaged with scripture has had 4 different people teach them how to read it.



The average Bible open teen has had 1 or 2 people teach them how to read it.




The average Bible unengaged teen has had no one teach them how to read it.

Even among Christians, Bible engagement is rare.

An Opportunity and a Problem




Today's Teens' Motivation Toward Justice


5 Greatest Concerns of Teens in Canada





Teens and Spiritual Mentoring

Spiritual Mentoring—Defined by these five statements:

- "There is someone in my life who encourages me to grow spiritually" strongly agrees
- "I have close personal friends who were adults from my church" strongly agrees
- "There is someone in my life who models prayer for me" strongly agrees
- "I regularly attend church to be connected with those older than me" agrees
- "A spiritual mentor has taught me how to read the Bible" selects this selfdescription

Low mentoring = selects 0 of these statements

Moderate mentoring = selects 1, 2 or 3 of these statements


High mentoring = Selects 4 or 5 of these statements
